DEBORAH LAFORET - Lead Minister, St. Paul's United Church

The year 2019 was the year I entered into my eighth year at St. Paul's and my first year in my new role at St. Paul's as Lead Minister. It has been another year of change for St. Paul's and for myself as a minister at St. Paul's.

The number of staff at St. Paul's grew in 2019. We began with the usual complement of two full-time ministers, an office administrator, music director, and a custodial contract. All of that has remained intact except for the two full-time ministers. I am now the one full-time minister, with a half-time minister and two part-time staff doing children's ministry and youth ministry. Although it's a good-sized staff for the size of our church, it will take some time to adapt to this new model.

As a faith community in the midst of great changes all around us, including a change in how we view religion and faith, we can expect St. Paul's to continue changing to fit its context and to fit the needs of the community around us. This is why the importance of the work of many of our teams cannot be understated. The Mission Team, The Outreach Team, The Mental Health & Wellness Team, and the Affirming Team are exploring how to be a church of compassion and justice, in and outside our walls. The Stewardship Team is helping us to be aware of how we share and care for our resources. The UCW, the Worship Team and the Community & Faith Formation Team are finding ways to connect to people at St. Paul's and the community, by being present, offering programs, and providing a space for the sacred and spiritual. Of course, we have our Finance team, Property team, M&P team, and Trustees who keep everything running smoothly in the background, supporting all this important work. Finally, we have the Communications teams, which helps us to toot our own horn, and keep us from being the best-known secret in Oakville! All these teams are comprised of people who care about the community of St. Paul's and feel a spiritual calling to share their time and talents and I am grateful to be a part of such a great team.

2019 was a year where we had two covenanting services, we hired three staff (four if you include my step into a new role), and we welcomed a host of new people onto Council and our various teams (as well as saying goodbye to a few). I think it has been a monumental year for St. Paul's and, although I wouldn't wish this much change and transition onto any community, it can bring a new energy and a clearer sense of purpose and mission. My prayer is that St. Paul's will continue to explore its place in the community and in the world and that we won't be shy about "tooting our own horn." We are a warm and inclusive space, daring to go where we have not gone before. Let's celebrate that!

AFFIRMING TEAM – Thea Sheridan-Jonah, *Team Co-Chair*

The St. Paul's Affirming Team had a big year in 2019 with moments of both little and tremendous inspiration. Affirm United, the organization that guides the affirming process, tells churches the affirming process will take about two years, the first year spent mostly on education and the second on action.

2019, being our first year as a team, we learned a lot about being an affirming ministry working in and out of our community. Our team is currently made up of the hardworking committed team of Kate Labelle, Gary Davis, Chris Lee, with the help of both our ministers Carolyn and Deborah and our co-chairs Judy DeMone and Thea Sheridan-Jonah.

In the past year our team has spent most of our time educating ourselves on the affirming process and why affirming is important. We held an affirming 'Lunch and Learn,' and met with other teams to talk about what affirming means for their groups. We are excited to continue our work this year.

Our upcoming work includes getting the vision statement approved by the congregation of St. Paul's, completing 'Creating Positive Spaces' training, having a PIE day service, collaborating with community organizations, and continuing to make St. Paul's an affirming place for all people. The St. Paul's vision statement has been approved by Affirm United, but in order to be a part of the work at St. Paul's we need the support of the congregation. As a team, we understand making St. Paul's a safe space for all people, especially people in the LGBTQ+ community, takes more than words. Therefore, members of our team, along with members of St. Paul's Council and St. Paul's Staff will be completing professional Safe Spaces training from the Positive Spaces Network.

Next, PIE Day!!! You have probably heard the word PIE from the Affirming Team a hundred times. As a refresher, PIE stands for *Public*, *Intentional* and *Explicit*. As a Church, it means that we will be *public* about our affirmation of all people, *intentional* about the affirming work we are doing and *explicit* about why we are becoming affirming. PIE Day will be celebrated nationally in the United Church during the week of March 14th (the 14th day of the 3rd month - 3.14) and we will have our celebration this year on **Sunday March 8th**, 2020. The Sunday service will include aspects of affirm and then we will gather after worship with soup and pies. This will be a great event to see what 'affirm' means in other congregations and what it can mean for St. Paul's. We are excited for the year to come and want to emphasize that if you have any questions about affirming or the work of the Affirming Team, do not hesitate to email affirm@stpaulsoakville.com or talk to one of the Affirming Team members.

CAPITAL PROJECTS TEAM – Harold DeVenne, Team Chair

This has been a year which has required patience as the process of rezoning the Manse has been a slow and sometimes painful activity. Due to activities beyond our control, there were months where we did not have any forward motion. This resulted in missing the 6-month timeframe to file our submission which led to another pre-consult meeting with the Town.

Since that meeting, all requirements have been worked on and we will file the necessary rezoning application by the end of January. My understanding of what follows is that after we get notice that our application is complete, we will complete the severance application and file it. Both applications should then move through the process together. The Town has 7 months to review and hopefully approve both applications within 7 months.

One outcome of the acceptance of our rezoning application will be at least one and possibly two very large signs posted on church property declaring we have made a rezoning request and will likely include the words Development Proposal which will likely spark some comments in the neighbourhood. We will look at ways to calm any concerns from the neighbours.

Once both applications are approved, the manse can be put up for sale by the Trustees. At this time, we will re-engage the architects and review the original proposal and begin finalizing the details of the renovation.

COMMUNITY & FAITH FORMATION TEAM – Grace Jeong, Team Representative

Formerly known as the Christian Development (CD) Committee, the Community and Faith Formation (CAFF) Team welcomed new members in the spring. We continue to support educational programs at St. Paul's and organize several church events focused on community formation and outreach.

We organized Pancake Tuesday in March and supported Sleeping Children around the World with its proceeds. In June, we hosted a church picnic on-site with family games and fun. We have run various P.A. Day camps and successfully completed two weeks of Vacation Bible School (VBS) camps in the summer. In September, we hosted the Welcome Back BBQ party. We also held a 'Shop in Peace' event with the Youth Group in November as part of community outreach and fundraising for the youth.


Meditation classes continued with Deborah and a 'Read the Bible in a Year' challenge started in September with monthly discussion groups. Tracy Mitchell started working as our new Children's Programming Coordinator, overseeing both the Godly Play and Blast programs. Along with Catherine Arcade-Pinette and Deborah, the children of St. Paul's put together an amazing rendition of 'Bohemian Rhapsody' for their annual Christmas pageant.


Deborah continued her work with the youth in 2019 with Carolyn supporting this work when she started in September. Victoria was a welcome addition to our staff team in November, but unfortunately has discerned that this role is not a good fit for her and finished her position with us on January 31, 2020. Carolyn and Deborah will continue working with the youth until someone else is hired to continue leading this important ministry. In the meantime, the youth continue to meet on Friday nights, attend special events throughout the year and support events within the church. Currently, they are fundraising for their trip to Calgary in August 2020 for Rendezvous, a United Church national gathering for youth, young adults and their leaders.

FINANCE TEAM – Darren Pinette, *Team Chair*

2019 was a transition year for St. Paul's, and that was reflected in this year's financial performance. St. Paul's finished the year with an operating deficit of \$20,408, which was 5.5% of total income and favourable to the budgeted deficit of \$31,524. The favourability to budget was driven by lower staff and building maintenance expenses. The expense favourability was partially offset by lower income. An income challenge of \$20,000 that was included in the 2019 budget was unsolutioned and offering income was softer than expected.

Offering income continued to be a challenge as 2019 offerings of \$217,442 were down 12.6% compared to the prior year, and has declined by 9% annually, on average, over the past five years (Exhibit A). Rental income growth has helped mitigate the decline in offering income by growing 28% annually, on average, since 2015 (Exhibit B). St. Paul's challenge will be to slow the decline in offering income while optimizing rental income as the Church progresses toward the sanctuary renovation, expected to begin in 2021.





2020 is expected to be another challenging year as offering income softness is expected to continue and rental income growth will slow. Expenses will increase modestly in 2020 as the Church on-boards people in key roles and increases its social media presence in order to help lift attendance and grow space rentals.

I would like to extend a HUGE thank you to a number of people who, without their dedication and commitment, would make managing the Church's day-to-day financial responsibilities very difficult, if not impossible:

- David Fan, for serving as St. Paul's Treasurer and producing our financial statements each month.
- Jeanne Kho, for managing day-to-day financial postings and paying bills.
- Grace Jeong and Rachel Couban, for managing payroll and making sure our staff gets paid.
- Elizabeth Phillips, for helping to transition the payroll activities to Grace and Rachel.
- Ron Shermet, for running a smooth counting operation.
- Judy DeMone, for always being available to provide support, advice and guidance.

MENTAL HEALTH & WELLNESS TEAM - Harold DeVenne, Team Chair

As the changes to the United Church structure were being made, there were funds set aside by Halton Presbytery for congregations to engage EDGE facilitators. Deborah found a group of people interested in how we could positively affect the mental health of those in the community.

We engaged Paul Miller as our facilitator and organized a Mental Health Roundtable for May 2019 where we talked with approximately 20 agencies about factors affecting mental health within our community. With Paul's help, we agreed to four key areas we might be able to focus on in moving mental health and wellness forward in Oakville. These four pillars are:

- Isolation amongst seniors
- Young people
- Families dealing with mental health issues
- Education to inform and reduce the stigma around mental health issues

We held a small Mental Health & Wellness Fair which coincided with our Christmas Bazaar and was well attended.

The team meets every 6-8 weeks and will focus on isolation amongst seniors and education during 2020. We have joined a couple of networks in Halton and will use some of these connections to explore a mental health and wellness educational event in late 2020 if we can partner with members of the local networks.

MISSION TEAM – Harold DeVenne, *Team Chair*

The role of the Mission Team is to encourage the congregation to live out our mission statement. The team will explore opportunities for the congregation to *connect* and *engage* with one another as well as the community and will work to keep the mission alive and active within the congregation.

We held a retreat in June to explore pastoral care as a focus for engaging in the mission and it was attended by about 20 people.

We had Matt Foxall from the Neighbour Care Network meet with the team to discuss how St. Paul's can get involved with the Network. We will be recommending to Council in February 2020 that we join the Network. In the coming year, we will find opportunities to learn about how we can get more involved with the Network and support those who depend on the Network for support.

A new information board was attached to the mission statement posters which highlights activities the congregation is involved in which support our mission.

The Mission Team looks forward to 2020 and working with Carolyn Smith as a member of the team who brings both energy and knowledge.

NURTURING CARE TEAM – Carilyn McNaught, Team Chair

We are a team of 7 who meet monthly on a Tuesday morning to discuss our visiting and the pastoral care of our congregation. Visiting those in the hospital, at home and in senior's residences helps us learn to listen! Our telephone ministry makes friendly calls to help church members feel connected to the St. Paul's family. It is important for YOU to let us know when someone is in the hospital, needs a visit, phone call, card or food. We drop off or mail bulletins to those who cannot attend our worship services.

In the spring and fall, two communion services were held in the friendship room on Wednesday afternoons. Tom Allen provided us music playing the guitar, and the ministers performed the service. We provide this ministry for those who may not be able to attend worship on Sundays, however everyone is welcome. The attendees were appreciative of the drivers, refreshments and the social time. We have a coffee time at El Speros on the last Tuesday of the month. It is a fun social time open to everyone.

Thanks to those who have provided the delicious casseroles, soup and muffins. We also were given the left-over muffins from the Santa Shack and soup from the Country Store at the Holiday Jingle Bazaar. In 2019, we delivered 16 casseroles, 10 soups and 22 packages of muffins to members experiencing grief or illness. If anyone would like to be part of this ministry by making food, please contact Carilyn McNaught at 905-827-1828. The Nurturing Care team sent out 126 cards letting members know we care and keep them in our prayers.

In the summer, the Vacation Bible Camp children creatively made 86 cards, which were mailed to the joy of the people receiving them. At Christmas, the Sunday School and Youth made 8 ornaments and 20 cards. Ten St. Paul's Prayer Bear were given as a symbol of our love and prayers.

Tots & Us meet Monday mornings with the support of Nurturing Care. Children and caregivers are invited for a time of play, music, story time, juice and cookies. We are grateful to Catherine Arcand-Pinette, Nancy Schaubel, Jesse Xie, Candace Allen, Christine Plessas and Ruth Holloway for providing this wonderful ministry.

In July, we served the lemonade after Sunday's service. At Christmas, we sent six students attending College or University away from home a Tim Horton's gift card. We are reliant on parents to tell us where the students are studying and for their addresses. Please let Judy DeVenne know.

On December 12th our first "carol sing" in the friendship was held. Ross Stretton played the piano and two wonderful Christmas stories were read. "The Longest Night" service was held in the sanctuary on Dec. 18th with Deborah Laforet, Carolyn Smith and the Nurturing Care team taking part. More members attended this year. The service was to help those who are experiencing grief or other problems during the Christmas season. Candles were lit. Refreshments were served in the friendship room.

OAKVILLE READY TEAM – Harold DeVenne, Team Chair

Oakville Ready is an initiative led by the Halton Environmental Network to establish an Oakville neighbourhood extreme weather resiliency hub model using places of worship as engagement and care anchors. The goal is to create an Oakville resiliency hub network that engages diverse community stakeholders to increase their personal resiliency, community capacity and understanding around how we can work to support each other during extreme weather events.

St. Paul's is a member of this hub network along with six other faith communities in Oakville. If an extreme weather event occurs that requires our neighbours to come to a safe place for a short period of time, we will provide refreshments, a safe place and friendly faces if our facility is not also affected by the extreme weather event.

Part of the commitment as a hub is to educate our own congregation and those around us with the assistance of the Oakville Ready leadership. Keep your eyes open for these educational events that will help you assess your preparedness for extreme weather.

We are currently a very small team and could use up to 4 additional members. There are not a lot of demands on the team until an event occurs that activates us as a hub location. If you would like more information, contact Harold DeVenne or Deborah Laforet for more information.

OUTREACH TEAM - Kate Labelle, Team Chair

2019 marked the beginning of a transitional period for the Outreach Team. Selina Bajorek stepped down from her position as Chair and long-time member of the team in June. Selina's enthusiasm, knowledge and commitment to the work of the Outreach Team was a great asset to both the team and St. Paul's as a whole and we thank her for her hard work and dedication. Due to other team members stepping away as a result of time constraints and other commitments, team membership is currently sitting at one. If you are interested in exploring ways in which St. Paul's can help make a difference in the community and the wider world, we would love to hear from you – we need you!

Despite our membership challenges, some great outreach initiatives took place in 2019 thanks to the support of the St. Paul's Community. These initiatives include but are not limited to:

- Exploring indigenous reconciliation in January/February.
- The St. Paul's Community continuing to support the United Church of Canada's Mission & Service Fund by contributing 10% of its total annual offerings. St. Paul's 2019 contribution to the Mission & Service Fund totaled \$24,500.
- Matt Foxall, Program Lead for Kerr Street Mission's Neighbour Care Network, speaking to the congregation about the work of the network in October. The Thanksgiving Offering (totaling \$2,300) was given to the Neighbour Care Network.
- The Christmas Offering (totaling \$2,390) being given to the Minister's Benevolent Fund.
- St. Paul's continuing to collect non-perishable food items for the foodbank.
- Under the direction of Doris Cassidy, St. Paul's continuing to support the Kiva Loans Program, a
 non-profit organization that allows people to provide interest-free "micro-loans" to low income
 entrepreneurs around the world. Two-hundred dollars from the 2019 Outreach Team budget
 went towards funding our support of Kiva. More information on how St. Paul's supports this
 initiative is available upon request, or for more general information on Kiva Loans you can visit
 www.kiva.org.
- Members of the St. Paul's Community helping to make Christmas a little merrier for five families in the community through donations of gift cards and food items. An additional \$134 from the 2019 Outreach Team budget was used to supplement these donations.
- Members of the St. Paul's Community supporting the Wesley Urban Ministries Christmas Store through donations of gifts for teens. An additional \$400 from the 2019 Outreach Budget was used to supplement these donations and went toward the purchase of Walmart Gift Cards.
- St. Paul's supporting the Wesley Urban Ministries Sunday Night Supper Program through a monetary donation of \$450 and the preparation/serving of dinner by members of the St. Paul's Community.

As we enter 2020, it is my hope that the Outreach Team gains both membership and momentum and I once again encourage people to join this important team and bring with them their ideas and suggestions. The Team will continue its support of the initiatives listed above, the only exception being the Wesley Urban Ministries Sunday Night Supper Program - we are instead exploring the possibility of participating in a similar meal program at Kerr Street Mission.

I would like to take this opportunity to offer a sincere thank you to the members of the St. Paul's Community for their continued support of the Outreach Team. I look forward to the year ahead and welcome any suggestions from the St. Paul's Community as to how we may best support the outreach work of the church.

PROPERTY TEAM – Sue MacDonald, Team Chair

The Property Team remained busy throughout 2019. Whether a home or a church, there is always something to fix, repair or improve around a property.

The major repair for 2019 was the excavation to replace the weeping tiles along the west wall of the small gym and small kitchen to stop the leaking occurring in these rooms. Three contractors provided quotes and H&N Basement Worx was chosen to complete the work. The repair was completed in mid-August. Thanks to Tom Allen and Harold DeVenne for securely re-attaching the downspouts in this area to prevent further water accumulation.

Sanctuary lighting requiring replacement was completed in October. Due to the awkwardness of this job, Miller Architectural Lighting was called in to perform the task.

Other items attended to this past year included the front door lock adjustment, lawn mower maintenance (Cliff's), a new gas meter (Union Gas) and painting of pipes for compliance (Avanti) as well as fire exit lighting replacement as needed (Millar). Investigating various calls such as 'no power in the small kitchen', 'no hot water' and 'there's no salt and it's icy" also keep the Property Team hopping.

Many thanks to all those who have volunteered for the various Property teams including the Security, Sunday Opening, Gardening and Lawn Mowing teams, as well as those who have helped with impromptu calls – Diane Wolder, Tom Allen, Don Cox, Harold DeVenne and Doug Gilham. Your continued efforts in maintaining the property are appreciated!

REFUGEE SPONSORSHIP TEAM – Pat Mason, Team Chair

The Refugee Team is composed of Selina Bajorek, Alice Deslauriers-Bunn, Bev Phillips, Hana Manssor, Matt Sheridan-Jonah, Deborah Laforet, and Pat Mason from St. Paul's and Gary Dobbie, Chris Middlebro, and Paul Peters from Glen Abbey. In 2019, we were very busy, following an initial time of waiting.

All the paperwork required by the government to sponsor refugees was submitted to the United Church of Canada (UCC), in December 2017, and then re-submitted in mid-September 2018, after some forms were changed by the government. Following some additional revisions, the UCC submitted our applications to the Department of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC).

In October 2018, we received emails from IRCC to say that our applications had been received. Remarkably, in November, we received notification that our four sponsorship applications for Juleet Barsoom Eeshoaa, her son Salam Zaker Mansoor Sakaria, her daughter Mariam and her husband Salam Zuhair Hanan Awlo, and her daughter Suzan and her husband Anas Salim Ayshoa Kolan and their sons Tonee and Dani, were approved for sponsorship under the Private Sponsorship of Refugees program. Their files were then transferred to the IRCC office in Beirut, Lebanon. With this new information, the committee decided it was time to organize a dinner dance fundraiser, and the planning began in earnest for Juleet's Spring Jubilee.

Happily, in February 2019, we received the news that all eight members of the family had their first consular interviews in Beirut. This meeting is the beginning of the process initiated by the government of Canada to vet all refugees. Subsequently, various medical and security checks are conducted. Now it was even more important to organize our fundraiser.

Juleet's Spring Jubilee took place on Saturday May 4, 2019. One hundred and forty guests enjoyed a catered dinner, followed by dancing to the music of our own "Tonight's Band". A Silent Auction was an important part of the evening festivities. Refugee team members, along with Wendy Walker and Jeff Laforet, worked hard to solicit items for the Silent Auction, to find sponsors for the event, to set up the Silent Auction and to decorate Watt Hall. The evening was a great success, realizing a profit of approximately \$17,000 for the Refugee fund.

On May 13, Juleet, Mariam, and Mariam's husband Salam arrived at Toronto Pearson airport. Five members of the committee, as well as seven members of their extended family who were already in Canada and the United States were there to greet them. Immediately, we were involved in organizing initial temporary housing at Sheridan College, language assessments, and medical appointments. Bank accounts, telephone accounts, and various types of paperwork had to be completed. On June 8, a team of volunteers from St. Paul's and Glen Abbey moved them into the rental housing that had been found at 351 Maurice Drive. This house was almost completely furnished with generous contributions from various members of our congregation. Salam began working fairly quickly, helped by the offer of a position from a member of St. Paul's congregation. Salam and Mariam also began English Lessons.

On July 8, Juleet's son Salam arrived. Again, committee members were involved in organizing his language assessment, and banking and telephone accounts. He also began working within several weeks after his arrival in Canada. These four family members have met other Iraqis living in the Halton/Peel area and have been able to enjoy visits with Juleet's daughter Leka, her husband Alain, and their three children. Leka and Alain have provided information and assistance to the family as well. Overall, our sponsored family members are making a great adjustment to life in Canada.

Since September 2019, committee members have had many contacts with the offices of John Oliver and Anita Anand, our MPs, to find out information about the four remaining members of the family that we have sponsored. Since October, there has been much political unrest in Lebanon, particularly in Beirut. We are anxious to get Anas, Suzan, Dani, and Tonee here, to begin their new life in Canada.

On December 20, 2019, the Refugee committee members hosted a potluck dinner at the church with our family, the landlords of the house we rented, the real estate agents who helped us find accommodation, and members of the congregation who have assisted with helping the family during 2019. It was a fun way to end the year and thank all those who have been involved in this great project.

Juleet's Spring Jubilee - May 4, 2019

Our dinner/dance fundraiser on May 4, 2019 was a totally fun evening. Bob Cowan, of CHCH, royally entertained us as our MC and kept the evening rocking and rolling. DJ Mike provided music during dinner and gave out a variety of door prizes to five lucky winners throughout the evening. Tonight's Band, composed of Catherine Arcand-Pinette, Anna Sheridan-Jonah, Deborah Laforet, Kent Palmer, Chris Arcand, Ian Stirling and Jack Peresin presented two great musical sets, to the delight of our listeners and dancers. They were all fantastic!

Tasty Catering, owned by Tom Francuz, catered the dinner. Our taste buds were stimulated with dishes of beef, pork medallions, chicken schnitzel, roasted potatoes, rice, mixed vegetables, salad, and rolls, all served family style. Dessert was a three-tiered cake, created and donated by Laura Strath, and cut and served by Pat Freedman. After dinner there were a couple of speakers, and then the dancing began! Between sets by Tonight's Band, we held a Live Auction for a gift certificate to Noble Bistro, a Classic Tour and Tasting (for 10) at Inniskillen Winery in Niagara, an opportunity to explore and use gift cards at various shops and restaurants in Kerr Village, and finally a week at a private, three bedroom cottage in Muskoka. There was lots of excitement, as Bob Cowan and Jeff Laforet encouraged our guests to bid on these opportunities. Later in the evening, the Silent Auction closed, and individuals were able to pick up the items that they had won.

Many people helped to make this event a success. Our event had a variety of corporate sponsors, whose logos were beautifully displayed in a large banner created by Neik Ermes, owner of GetWrapped.ca. Guests were encouraged to have their pictures taken by Jean Maimot, our photographer for the evening, in front of this colourful banner. During the month of October, we asked Members and Adherents (those who attend regularly without formally joining the congregation) to make a financial commitment to the Church which they pledge to give toward the work of the church over the next 12 months.

It is on the basis of this commitment that the Finance Team and Church Council established a budget for 2020, making it very important for each and every one of us to follow through.

Pledge forms were picked up, delivered or mailed to the 157 persons or families that are the backbone of St. Paul's. Approximately 30% of the congregation responded and returned their pledge forms.

Financial gifts can and do come into our church throughout the year, so there is never a wrong time to make a gift over and above your pledge, or if you didn't make a pledge, to make a gift.

Stewardship is a personal decision for each individual and stewardship means something different to each of us. As a congregation, we continue to look after our members, our neighbourhood and our environment by committing to support the ministry of St. Paul's with our time, energy, talents and financial resources.

UNITED CHURCH WOMEN (UCW) – Pat Mason, Team Representative

The United Church Women (UCW) have the purpose to unite all women of the congregation for the total mission of the Church and to provide a medium through which they may express their loyalty and devotion to Jesus the Christ, in Christian Witness, Fellowship, and Service.

To achieve this purpose, we participate in meetings that provide a worship component, fellowship, and new learning, as well as the development of church events. In 2019, the UCW did some restructuring. Although membership in the UCW is open to all the women in the congregation, at the beginning of 2019, the UCW had 48 members. As in previous years, the larger group was divided into four units, named Sarah, Live, High 5's, and Mariam. These units usually meet on a monthly basis, or as organized. They may meet at the church or in individual homes. These monthly meetings help us to achieve our purpose through programs, worship, outreach, and fellowship. Many of our members choose to attend only the monthly unit meetings, which may have a stronger focus on fellowship.

In addition to the unit meetings, there were three general meetings. On February 5, the members met to decide if we would continue to have a UCW at St. Paul's. Much was undecided, as the United Church General Council had previously voted to alter its structure. We were unsure whether there would be something similar to the Halton Presbyterial that we had been a part of. In addition, like many organizations, we had a dearth of individuals willing to take on leadership rolls, such as president, secretary, treasurer etc. Without leadership, it becomes difficult to organize general meetings, find speakers, and keep records of our proceedings and finances.

At the February meeting, we decided to continue with certain activities. Unit meetings would continue. All units would continue in the Least Coin program. This is an international program, operated by the Women's Inter Church Council, which provides for all women to support international programs for women by offering the least coin of their country whenever they gathered to worship or learn together. In addition, we would continue to provide outreach to grieving families by offering refreshments following funerals. We also decided that we would have two general meetings open to all members during the year. Some members also participated in the World Day of Prayer in March and the restructured District 9 UCW Annual Meeting in April.

At the February meeting, several individuals volunteered to assist with our new organizational structure. Helga de Lint would coordinate information to be shared with UCW members, Carilyn McNaught would be the UCW representative to attend Council meetings, Terry Farris would be Corresponding secretary, Pat Mason would be Treasurer, Carilyn McNaught and Sue Rumsey would be additional signers at the credit union, Joan Ford and Evelyn Little would coordinate Outreach for Funerals, and Irene Murray would coordinate UCW membership lists with addresses etc. Also, Sarah unit would look after Sunday morning coffee in March. Finally, Cynthia Steneveld, Carilyn McNaught, Sharon Wiese, and Catherine Arcand-Pinette offered to be the contact persons for the units. We are thankful to all these individuals who offered their time, energy, and leadership.

In June, Sarah unit organized a General meeting, with a speaker from Mercy Ships, a hospital humanitarian program. In November, we held a meeting to discuss our finances and to make decisions about how we would spend the money we made in 2019.

The UCW would like to thank all members of the congregation for their support of our one fundraiser in 2019. Carilyn McNaught and Shirley-Anne Cooper-Maimot were the main organizers of the Holiday Jingle Bazaar.

This fundraiser provides the monies to support UCW outreach activities. In 2019 the UCW was able to provide financial support to St. Paul's and other UCC operations, as well as to community agencies. Support for UCC endeavors included: the St. Paul's General operating fund; the St. Paul's Memorial Fund, in memory of UCW members who died in 2019; Mission & Service of the UCC; St. Paul's College in Waterloo; and the Rendezvous 2020 youth conference. This support totaled \$7000.00.

Financial support was also provided to the following community services and Outreach organizations: Canadian Foodgrains Bank; Habitat for Humanity; ROCK services for children and youth; Halton Women's Place; Hope Place – Women's Treatment Centre; Home Suite Hope; Ian Anderson House; Kerr Street Mission; Salvation Army Lighthouse; Wesley Urban Ministries; Sleeping Children Around the World; SOCKS; Lighthouse for Grieving Children; Acclaim Health/Alzheimer Day Care; and CAMH. This support totaled \$3750.00.

In 2019, we were saddened by the loss of four former long-time UCW members – Marg Hockin, Paula Arnold, Nancy Wickett and Edna McCutcheon.

We are pleased to set up the program, regardless of the number present, because it's such a joy to get to know these little ones and their moms, dads, grandparents or babysitters. The staff and caregivers benefit from our social time together as much as the little ones do.

If you know of anyone who would benefit from our program, please direct them our way. All our welcome and we would be glad to see new faces joining us.

HOLIDAY JINGLE BAZAAR – Carilyn McNaught, Event Leadership Team

Our annual Holiday Jingle Bazaar was held on November 2nd under the guidance of the UCW, Shirley-Anne Cooper-Maimot and Carilyn McNaught. It takes over 200 people to make this event a success.

Many people work for months knitting, sewing, preserving, pricing and obtaining donations from businesses and the congregation for the Silent Auction. Information sheets were sent out to previous vendors and artisans. The bazaar was advertised in the newspapers, social media, bulletins and flyers. The last month all are busy baking, making soups, casseroles and candy, etc. Many volunteers work behind the scenes to ensure that things run smoothly, including Jeanne Kho, our Secretary, and Pat Mason, who did all the advertising, obtained our table floats and counted the money with her helpers. 2019-2020 Program Year

The Beaver Colony has been divided into 4 lodges which are smaller working groups. The Beavers frequently divide into these small groups to complete activities and brainstorm ideas and review the program after each term (fall, winter, spring).

Members: This year we have 24 Beavers and 5 Scouters leading the Colony. We are running a balanced program with a focus on including lots of physical activity for many of our Beavers who like to move.

Program Highlights: We have been participating in activities relating to many areas of the Pond map. We took advantage of the recent snow and had a fun night of sledding. We are planning to organize a night hike in an upcoming meeting (Ringtail's Hollow, Environment & Outdoors). We have worked on drama skills practicing previous skits and have created new skits for the Colony performers (Rascal's River, Creative Expression). We will soon start up our white tail council, using third year Beavers as leaders for the colony. The white tails will work toward the North Star Award. To achieve they will be working on a project in conjunction with a local charity. The Beavers have visited the Oakville Museum as well as fire station number 3 (Big Brown Beaver, Citizenship). We have enjoyed some active and quiet games, a board game night, and a night of science discovery.

Beavers participated in fundraising during Apple Day weekend. Beavers also participated in our All Sections "Area 51" Camp and enjoyed learning about space. Beavers participated in a Christmas movie night with the Cubs. They also attended our bowling party with all sections. Upcoming activities: There are many more activities and events planned for the winter and spring months. These include creating Beaver Buggies and racing them. Some Beavers from our Colony will be attending our Winter Beaveree next month. We also have a Summer Beaveree and a sleepover at the Bradley museum planned this spring/summer.

7th Trafalgar Scout Group Cub Scout Pack

With the Cub Scouts motto of "Do Your Best" front and center, Cubs are encouraged to try new and more challenging activities. Learning important first aid skills, paddling a canoe for the first time, or leading a game at camp will open the door for Cubs to try other adventures they never thought possible.

Along the way, Cubs learn how to take care of themselves and work as a team – and most importantly have a lot of fun!

2019-2020 Program Year

7th Trafalgar Pack is running at capacity with 32 youth this year, 25 boys and 7 girls, supported by 7 Scouters both male and female. Weekly meetings could be a night where we blow off some steam with some active games, or Cubs could be working on skills from any of the program areas including climbing, sailing, Scoutcraft, camping, trail, winter, paddling, aquatic or emergency skills. Youth in this age group are learning independence and self-sufficiency while still under the mentorship of our excellent group of Scouters who bring a wide variety and depth of experience to the program. Youth are involved in planning, execution and review of the Scouting year and the programming that takes place.

Cubs help to fundraise for their program by participating in Apple Day, a community outreach weekend where we are out distributing apples in our area at local shops. They also spend the month of October selling Scout popcorn, a primary fundraiser for both the group and for Scouts Canada nationally.

In early October the Cubs spent an afternoon out on Bronte creek learning how to canoe, for many of them it was their first time. Along the way they experienced a rich variety of wildlife just in the section between Lakeshore and Rebecca St. with the salmon practically jumping in the boats! Working with Film.ca, the 7th Trafalgar Pack also ran the first ever Filmmakers camp where the Cubs took part in planning, writing, casting, acting and directing a movie of their own creation. It was then premiered at the theatre in a red-carpet private event for all the friends and family. Winter came early and our Area 51 themed All Sections camp in November included tobogganing, a wide variety of outdoor games and activities and a visit to outer space in a mobile planetarium. In February Cubs will be working on their winter and Scoutcraft outdoor adventures skills at our winter camp. Our Cub Kar program sees the youth designing and building their own wooden Cub Kars for racing on our 42-foot track in the gym. We then participate in the Oakville Area Cub Kar Rally where 7th Trafalgar is looking for a 5th championship in a row.

We take our racing seriously! We have 2 other camps to mention which will make this year an outstanding one. The first is our Cubmarine camp where Cubs will get to go on board a Canadian submarine, dry-docked on the shores of Lake Ontario and experience what life is like for a submariner. In the summer, 7th Trafalgar Cubs will join with 1000 or so other Cubs from across Canada in the Canadian Cub Jamboree, a week-long camp held in Guelph, Ontario.

7th Trafalgar Scout Group Scout Troop

Scouts is about having fun while gaining valuable leadership skills and self-confidence.

Scouts enjoy outdoor adventures like mountain biking, rock climbing and lots of camping while working together with other young people to accomplish thrilling challenges and contribute to their communities.

2019-2020 Program Year

This year the Scout Troop has grown to 18 Scout and 5 Scouters. Scout regular meetings include indoor and outdoor games; camp and wilderness skills along Scout craft activities include rope lashing, stove and lantern, fire safety, axe and saw safety, knife safety, and outdoor survival skills. Scouting requires a strong outdoor focus. One meeting per month (average) is held outdoors. This year we have also had in depth discussions around the topics of camp planning, showing respect for selves and knife safety. We have been focused on Outdoor Adventure Skills including Scoutcraft, Sailing, Camping, Trail, winter, Paddling, Aquatic, Vertical, and Emergency Skills. We had several outdoor hikes, swim nights at a local pool in order to determine the swimming skills of participants.

Scouts have been busy working on core aspects of the program including Promise, Law, Motto, Troop Patrol Structure, and SPICES. (Social, Physical, Intellectual, Character, Emotional and Spiritual)

Our Scouts participated in the Oakville Scouts "Amazing Race Scout Edition" this year. Over 100 Scouts forming over 15 Patrols from the Oakville Area participated. Typically, 7th Trafalgar is one of the Groups to beat, and the 2 patrols we entered came in respectable 2nd and 4th places.

The Scout leaders along with a parent volunteer organized our group participation in the annual Apple Day event in October, which is always very successful at raising community awareness of the Scout Movement. Our Scouts actively participate in the Scout Popcorn program to raise funds for group programming. Congratulations go to Jayden McBride for being the highest seller in the group. (3rd Year in a row)

The Scouts/Venturers organize and hold a family spaghetti dinner for all the 7th Trafalgar Scouting Group on World Thinking Day (Founders Day) each third week in February at St. Paul's Church. All are welcome to attend to celebrate with us. The Scouts attended our annual Christmas bowling party and year-end wrap-up BBQ picnic

Our Scouts participated/volunteered with clean-up duties following the St. Paul's Pancake dinner and the annual Spring Rummage Sale and Holiday Jingle Bazaar events. We intend on volunteering again this year to assist with cleanup at Pancake and Rummage Sale events

Our program goal is to ensure camping trip every 2 months. Since our last report we have held 7 camps. The Scouts went Winter Camping at Scout Camp Everton Jan 13, held a joint Scout-Cub Camp at Blues Springs Scout Camp, Oakville Area Summer Camp, Kick off Manitou Scout Camp, joint Scout/Venture Canoe trip on the Grand River, the Challenge Trophy Camporee in upstate New York, and our Annual All Sections Camp at Scout Camp Impessa. The Scouts are planning a Spring Camp, a joint Scout/Cub bike camp and ending the year with a Spring Canoe Trip in Algonquin Park.

7th Trafalgar Scout Group Venturer Scout Company

The Venturer Scout program offers exciting, real-life, hands-on experiences for youth. Venturers learn to nurture an active, healthy lifestyle; acquire the knowledge and skills for career development; and participate in thrilling outdoor adventures. Weekend events, extended hikes, Leave No Trace camping, spiritual reflection, community service and round out the Venturer experience.

2019-2020 Program Year

Since our last Report, the Venturers held a Winter Camp at Foote Lake (Novar) where they snowshoed, had a beef jerky contest, and participated in Winter Camping Exhibition. We also held an Independent camp at Blue Springs Scout Reserve (hiking a KM into Adirondacks – camping without leaders), and our annual canoe trip in Algonquin Park.

Michael Rouse and Thomas Reilly received their Chief Scout Award in June. (Highest achievement award earned by Scouts and 1^{st} year Venturers – 4 years to achieve)

September had the Venturers (along with Senior Scouts prepare for a short Canoe trip down the grand river by retaking a swim test, and planning menus, trip, and gear for a two-night trip finishing at Grand River Conservation Area.

October saw the Venturers and leaders along with a parent volunteer organize our group participation in the annual Apple Day event in October, which is always very successful at raising community awareness of the Scout Movement.

In late October the Venturers camped in Upstate New York, Challenge Trophy Camp.

November began with Venturers contributing to the success of St. Paul's Holiday Jingle Bazaar, by assisting with the takedown of booths, tables and chairs, and general clean up. Venturers also assisted with running "The Amazing Race" Scout Edition

The Venturers also contributed to the success of the 7th Trafalgar All Sections Camp. This year the Venturer Company staffed the kitchen (shopping, cooking and cleaning) ensure 100 participants were well fed. 17. 2018 Financial Statement Presentation

Doug Francis

Doug Francis stated that, financially, St. Paul's had a successful year, ending the year with a deficit of less than \$1,500. Contributing to the finances for the year were \$10,000 from the Trustees' accumulated surplus, \$4,000 from the UCW and a bequest of \$11,000. It was noted that there was a serious decline in offerings from the levels of previous years. This serious decline in offerings was partially offset by strong rental income.

Discussion: Carol Anne Hunt questioned why the organ was still listed in fixed assets for \$28,000 when the organ is no longer operable. Doug explained that over the years St. Paul's has accumulated monies from various year-end surpluses of revenue over expenses. The list of "assets" included on the year-end balance sheet details how some of this accumulated surplus money has been spent I.e. we no longer have \$28,737 of our accumulated surpluses in the bank because in the past that amount was spent on the organ.
